Mother Mary Louise Meahan (Dorothy Mary Emma Meahan) was born in Bathurst, NB on December 18, 1873. She entered the Sisters of Charity-Halifax, in 1895 at the age of 22.

S. Mary Louise was an educator who taught in Reserve Mines, NS, St. Peter's and St. Margaret's Schools in Dorchester, MA as well as the Academy of the Assumption, Wellesley, MA.

In 1923, S. Mary Louise was called back from Massachusetts to Mount Saint Vincent Motherhouse to serve as Vicar General of the Congregation. She was elected as Mother General on August 7, 1926. The re-election of Mother Mary Louise to a second and third term was made as an expression of loyalty and esteem from a grateful community. The permission of Pope Pius XI was necessary before a third term of office could be accepted.

She served as Mother General from 1926-1944, a period of 18 years!

During her three terms in office, Mother Mary Louise and her Council were responsible for the opening and expansion of 32 institutions (schools, hospitals, convents) in various provinces of Canada from east to west and in the United States: Massachusetts, Washington State and New York.

Worthy of note are: the Halifax Infirmary, generally regarded as one of the best and most up-to-date

institutions of its kind at that time in Canada, and Mount Saint Vincent College. One final accomplishment was St. Brigid's Home for senior citizens in Quebec City, which was one of the first services of its kind to be established in North America. Under her direction, a splendid new building was erected at the Academy of Assumption in Wellesley 175 SISTER PROFILES Hills. Her vision was responsible for the establishment of many new missions and to her also goes credit for a number of fine hospitals in the Canadian West.

Mother Mary Louise died on June 3, 1945, at the age of 72, not long after completing many years of Congregational service. Numerous

Mother Mary Louise Meahan was buried in Mount Olivet Cemetery, Halifax, beside the grave of her predecessor Mother Mary Berchmans Walsh. How beautiful that these two outstanding leaders, who worked so well together for the Sisters of Charity for so many years, now rest side by side in this holy place! Life is not taken away; it is but changed (Preface: Mass for the Dead).**The good that Mother Mary Louise has done remains and will remain, in all the geographical areas touched by the charism of the Sisters of Charity - Halifax!**

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
