Marie Appollonia Louise de Jong
was born in West Bathurst, NB, on
December 17, 1923, daughter of
Jacobus Albertus de Jong of Rotterdam,
Holland, and Mary Elizabeth (Bertin)
de Jong of West Bathurst. She entered
the Sisters of Charity at Mount Saint
Vincent Motherhouse, Halifax, on
September 8, 1942 and became a novice
with the name Sister Mary Appollonia in
March, 1943. She made her first vows
on April 1, 1945, and her final vows on
August 15, 1951, at Mount Saint Vincent,
Halifax.

S. Appollonia was a "hands on" person, a doer, a born helper, always ready to assist others in practical ways.

She liked to sew and many Sisters benefited from her willing help in hemming and mending. She could knit and crochet and her craft projects usually had the goal of helping some needy group.

She enjoyed making her special dolls for the Children's Hospital or the missions.

S. Appollonia brought these practical skills, her generosity and her genuine care for others to her work in the community. Her first 12 years she served as housekeeper

in convents in British Columbia and Nova Scotia. The next 13 years she was Director of Laundry at Mount Saint Vincent College and the Motherhouse. Two years at Central Buying ended her service at the Motherhouse.

From 1972 until 1988, S. Appollonia served at St. Vincent Guest House in Halifax as sacristan, with responsibility for the priests' dining room. She continued to work at St. Vincent's as a volunteer in the Activities Department until her retirement in 1995. S. Appollonia volunteered in the sewing room for
