August 15, 2024 was a milestone for the Sisters of Charity - Halifax, Associates and all those they have worked with and served over the years. It marked 175 years since four Sisters from New York arrived at the port of Halifax to establish a mission in Canada. Little did they know they would grow in numbers, spread out to the North, South, East and West of their new country, Canada, the United States, Latin America and the Caribbean.

The celebration at the Atlantica Hotel was historic. Our Sesquicentennial served as

a fitting prelude to our 175th celebration. However, the reality of the completion taking place within the Congregation added another layer of blessings and gratitude to the day.

It was more than a party, it was a paean of thanksgiving for all the women past and present who responded wholeheartedly to God's invitation to serve as Vincent, Louise and Elizabeth exemplified.

Every grand gathering has multiple high points. Celebrants of the 175th could look at days of yore via multimedia, exult in the present by just looking around and trust in the future by their shared acts of faith and hope. There could be as many highlights as persons present!

For me there was a very particular highlight. It began when two small buses pulled up outside the hotel and in came a parade of Sisters from Caritas. They added a precious dimension to the celebration. And, of course supporting them were their faithful nursing aides with their gentle manner and ministrations. All of them would be with us for casual sharing, Mass, dinner and entertainment. Their presence, plus those with us via Zoom for the same events, made the party complete!

Many of these Sisters were pioneers in their time, helping to open new ventures, ending others and moving in faith to wherever they were sent. After Vatican II they met multiple new challenges. New ways of living out the gospel and deepening personal and communal prayer were introduced.

A broadening of the understanding of the vows led to new freedoms in decision making and assuming personal responsibility for their choices personally and professionally. Adapting their dress to the modern era ensued. To all of these changes they responded in faith, believing that if this was what was needed to better serve and be an integral part of the present day missionary life of the church, so be it. It could not have been easy. But they did it to be relevant in an ever evolving church.

The joy that afternoon and evening was tangible. After a wonderful meal, Heather Rankin and her musicians brought the celebration to a precious peak. Faces in the audience were aglow with joy. The lively and at times moving music along with Heather's sense of humour filled the hearts of all present. This was yet another blessing from the God who loves us so.

With grateful hearts many accompanied the retired Sisters to help them board the buses for the ride home. It seemed the outing was worth every scintilla of fatigue that may ensue. August 15, 2024 was a day for the history books. It was a fitting cap to 175 years of sharing God's love and presence with all others generously and joyfully.

## 175 years of joyful witness to love by Mary Flynn, Congregational Archivist

At our 175th Anniversary celebration on August 15, 2024, the Congregation received a significant gift—a handwritten copy of our 1857 Constitutions. These are the first Constitutions of the Halifax community after receiving approval from Pope Pius IX to become a diocesan community. Due to the Motherhouse fire in 1951, we did not have an original copy of our first Constitutions, only photocopies of typed versions.


The Constitutions were recently discovered in the Sisters of Charity of New York Archives and were presented to S. Margaret Mary Fitzpatrick by SCNY President S. Donna Dodge. They were wrapped in Nova Scotia tartan and placed in a wooden box.

The gift also came with a cheeky request from S. Donna: "PAY UP!" She presented S. Margaret Mary with an overdue invoice for the ongoing maintenance of Mother M. Basilia McCann's gravesite at Mount Saint Vincent Cemetery in New York. Mother Basilia was the first Mother of the Congregation and spent nine years in Halifax before returning to her Sisters in New York in 1858.

The gift of the Constitutions felt especially poignant at this moment, like a tangible connection to the early years as we journey through the final years of the Congregation.

At the time that the 1857 Constitutions were written, there were only five professed Sisters and a handful of postulants and novices.

Could they have ever dreamt that the seed their new community planted would grow into what the Sisters of Charity - Halifax have become?
